In addition to our students, we opened a new building, a new cabin, new play equipment and 6 new members of staff joined the team. Ofsted had visited us in July and approved of our new accommodation, ensured that we were still meeting all the required standards and made many more positive comments about our offer. We started September with three classes, one in Key Stage 2 and two Key Stage 3 classes. In Key Stage 3 we introduced our students to some subject specific teaching, two lunch time clubs, coached PE sessions and several trips off site to enable the development of independence, resilience, life skills and perseverance. This allows for the building of key life skills, confidence and independence. This term there have been several opportunities on offer.



Our Key Stage 2 students had a lovely day out visiting both The Raptor Foundation and Cuckoo Bridge Farm and Pumpkin Patch.

Classroom News:

Our students continue to work hard engaging in their learning and acquiring new skills.

English: Our first English unit in KS3 this term was Language and Literature Across the Ages which was a brief introduction to a range of literary examples from history. For Old English students looked at Beowulf, for Middle English at Chaucer, then Shakespeare and the Romantic poets e.g. Blake, Shelley, Keats. Finally they looked at Oliver Twist as a lead up to the next half term's study of a whole Dickens text.

In the second half of this term Manta Rays studied A Christmas Carol and started developing knowledge and skills for analysing texts e.g. pathetic fallacy, understanding a character in different contexts, allegory and symbolism, selecting quotes from the text, pathos and inference.

Meanwhile, Elephants studied Great Expectations and, similarly, began working on recognising different techniques used by the author e.g. atmosphere, character development, relationships between characters, pathetic fallacy and foreshadowing. Students used deductive reasoning and found evidence in the text to support an arqument.

Maths: This term our students have worked in smaller groups which has allowed them to practice more skills, consolidate previous learning, begin the process of closing gaps in their knowledge bases and build confidence. The different groups have covered a good range of topics which include measurement and converting units, angles and parallel lines, area of 2D shapes, calculating perimeter, fractions, ratio and algebra. Different students work in various ways with some preferring more practical maths and others feeling confident to challenge their maths knowledge and work out answers to complex and tricky questions. A good term all round.

Science: Science this term has involved making slides and using a light microscope to observe them. Students have looked at names of organelles in a cell, the differences between plant and animal cells, features of specialised cells, the function of cell membranes and the differences between diffusion and osmosis.

In our forces unit students named a range of forces and used force arrows to show where these occur. They predicted the outcome when forces are unbalanced and measured force using a Newton meter and related the results to Newton's laws of motion. Dr Jo from Dr Jo's Science Solutions visited and conducted some Science sessions about microplastics and oil spills which had practical elements and related to a topic many of our students are interested in marine life.

Geography: In Geography this term we have covered Deserts and Rivers. The deserts unit involved locations of deserts, landforms, climate and the impact of weathering, plant and animal adaptation, ecosystems, desertification and human activity in a variety of desert locations. This topic led to thinking about global warming and climate change, and human activity in Antarctica and the Arctic. A visit to Byron's Pool and The Cam in Grantchester launched our unit on Rivers. We then moved onto how humans use rivers, the water cycle, the parts of a river from drainage basin to mouth, with a closer look at the River Severn.

RE: In R.E. students have been comparing Christianity and Islam, they have been asking and discussing big philosophical questions, e.g. about the meaning of life. In the lead up to Christmas they have been thinking about whether Christmas has lost its religious meaning and how different people celebrate this time of year.

History: In History, we began The Renaissance with a look at opposing historical perspectives regarding Gutenberg's printing press, and primary and secondary sources. This was followed by trade routes, European exploration and empires, Renaissance art and finally Martin Luther and Protestantism. In the second half term the Tudors were our focus, starting with the War of the Roses and Battle of Bosworth and how history is written by the victors. Then Henry VIII and the factors that contributed to the split from Rome, Edward VI, whether Bloody Mary was deserving of her nickname, Elizabeth I, a recreation of the Spanish Armada and the reasons it failed.

Art: Art is very popular with students often choosing to work on their projects in their free time. They have made huge steps in being more adventurous in trying different materials and techniques and developing the use of a creative journal to record this. They have made animal portraits using drawing and enlarging techniques, and have also made landscapes, using painting and mixed media, inspired by David Hockney.

D&T: In D&T students made a 3D model of a room and developed confidence using new materials and tools. In Textiles they sewed a drawstring bag and produced a range of bags with different designs and fabrics.

Computing: In Computing this term the topics covered have been computing systems (programs and the operating system, and the physical components that store and execute programs) and manipulating data in spreadsheets (using functions to calculate and sort data).

PHSE: Our students have looked at two main areas this term, mental health and wellbeing and a unit looking at and understanding the impact of drugs and alcohol. Many of our students felt able to share their own knowledge/experiences with their peers alongside asking very important questions. One class then designed their own poster for our younger students discouraging them from mis-using drugs or alcohol in the future. Our students were very discerning, wanting their posters not to scare the younger students but ensure they had important information.

PE: PE this term for some was a tale of two halves. Great enjoyment was had by most on the lake continuing to practice their canoeing skills and towards the end of term most of our students were able to enjoy ice skating sessions. Less students enjoyed the opportunities to practice their ball skills in basketball and football but for those who did gains in confidence and ability were many.

A big thank you to all our staff, external coaches that have given our students amazing opportunities to grow their knowledge bases, practice their life skills and build their confidence this term.
