

## **Hope Tree School Protective Measures Risk Assessment February 2022**

This risk assessment is based on Hope Tree School and covers the school being open for students to access onsite education, and also covers students working remotely from home, and will be reviewed as and when Government advice changes, or the school based context changes. Public Health England know that the predominant new variant of coronavirus (COVID-19) is more transmissible however, PHE advice remains that the way to control this virus is with the system of controls, even with the current new variants.

Prevention Minimise contact with individuals who are unwell with COVID19 symptoms.  Are the controls in place? YES	· Staff and other adults do not come into Hope Tree School if they have coronavirus (COVID19) symptoms or have tested positive in the last 10 days (unless they have tested negative for two consecutive days after 5 days of self-isolation), and anyone developing those symptoms during the school day is sent home with immediate effect. · Staff and students to self-test at home for COVID19 twice weekly and to not attend school if they test positive. On the receipt of a positive test result students or staff must follow the self-isolation guidance. · Anyone in the school becomes unwell with a new, continuous cough or a high temperature, or has a loss of, or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia), they are sent home and advised to follow 'stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID19) infection', which sets out that they must self-isolate for at least 10 days—unless they have a negative test on two consecutive days after 5 days of self-isolation. · If a student is awaiting collection from school due to COVID19 related illness, they are moved, where possible, to Wellbeing Centre where they can be isolated behind a closed door, with appropriate adult supervision if required. are moved to an area which is at least 2 metres away from other people. If the ill student needs to use a bathroom while waiting to be collected, they should use the student toilet opposite the kitchen. If a student is awaiting collection from residential due to illness, they are moved, where possible, to the Independent Learning Space where they can be isolated behind a closed door, with appropriate adult supervision if required. A window should be opened for ventilation. If it is not possible to isolate them, they

· Everyone will wash their hands thoroughly for 20 seconds with soap and running water or use hand sanitiser after any contact with someone who is unwell. The area around the person with symptoms must be cleaned with normal household disinfectant after they have left to reduce the risk of passing the infection on to other people. · PPE will be worn by staff caring for the ill student while they await collection. If a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained (such as for a very young child or a child with complex needs). More information on PPE use can be found in the safe working in education, childcare and children's social care settings, including the use of personal protective equipment (PPE) guidance.

· In an emergency 999 will be called.

	· Any members of staff who have helped someone with symptoms and any students who have been in close contact with them do not need to go home to self-isolate unless they develop symptoms themselves (in which case, they should arrange a test) or if the symptomatic person subsequently tests positive (see below) or they have been requested to do so by NHS Test & Trace.  · The Infection Control Policy and Cleaning in non-healthcare settings guidance to be followed to clean the area.  · Any medication given to ease the unwell individual's symptoms, e.g. paracetamol, is administered in accordance with the Administering Medications Policy.  · Spillages of bodily fluids, e.g. respiratory and nasal discharges, are cleaned up immediately in line with the Infection Control Policy and Cleaning in non-healthcare settings guidance.  · If staff feel unwell they should ring the school office from their car to inform them that they are going home. A member of the Admin Team should then inform a member of the Leadership Team.

YES	· Students will be supported to clean their hands regularly, including when they arrive at the setting, when they return from breaks, when they change rooms and before and after eating. · The school will build hand washing routines into school culture. · Fixed or mobile hand sanitisers are provided in all classrooms and offices. · Students arriving at school wearing a face covering are instructed not to touch the front of their face covering during use or when removing them. Students immediately wash their hands on arrival before heading to their classroom. Students removing face coverings must dispose of disposable face coverings in a covered bin or place reusable face coverings in a bag to take home with them, they must then ensure they wash their hands. Hands must be sanitised before and after removing face masks during the day and at lunchtimes. Classroom resources and materials which are used and shared by students or staff are cleaned regularly, along with all frequently touched surfaces. Wipes and disinfectant spray will be provided in classrooms for

this purpose. Sharing materials resources and

shared they are disinfected after use.

· Students limit the amount of equipment they bring into school each day, to essentials such as lunch boxes, hats, coats, books, stationery and mobile phones. Bags are allowed. Students and teachers can take books and other shared resources home, although unnecessary sharing is avoided. Rules on hand cleaning, cleaning of the resources and rotation apply to these resources. Student's mobile phones will be stored in individual bags when they are handed to the tutor team in the morning.

- · Staff and students have their own individual and very frequently used equipment, such as pencils and pens, these are not shared.
- · Physical Education classes should be kept in consistent groups and sports equipment thoroughly cleaned between being used by different groups. Contact sport to be avoided. Outdoor sports to be prioritised and large indoor spaces used to ensure maximising distance between students and high levels of cleaning and hygiene. COVID19: Guidance on phased return of sport and recreations.
- · Staff will be required to sanitise the touch points of school vehicles after driving.
- · Any educational day visits must be conducted in line with relevant COVID-secure guidelines and regulations in place at that time. This includes system of controls,

	such as keeping children within their consistent groups and the COVID-secure measures in place at the destination.  • Staff planning the trip should undertake full and thorough risk assessments in relation to all educational visits to ensure they can be undertaken safely. As part of this risk assessment, staff will need to consider what control measures need to be used and follow wider advice on visiting indoor and outdoor venues. Staff should consult the health and safety guidance on educational visits when considering visits.

	· Students who have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for Covid19 will be informed, as will their parents/carers. They will be advised to take regular LFT tests. Close contact means: · Direct close contacts - face to face contact with an infected individual for any length of time, within 1 metre, including being coughed on, a face-to-face conversation, or unprotected physical contact (skin-to-skin) · Proximity contacts - extended close contact (within 1 to 2 metres for more than 15 minutes) with an infected individual · Travelling in a small vehicle, like a car, with an infected person · Records of students and staff who have been in close contact will be kept. This does not need to include every interaction a member of staff or student has. · Household members of those contacts who are sent home do not need to self-isolate unless the young person develops symptoms, in which case they would need to self-isolate for 10 days (unless they test negative on two consecutive days after 5 days of self-isolation) and should follow self-isolation guidance.
